RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. An Exhibit may not be entered in more than one class.
- 2. A judge may not be an exhibitor in any class in which he acts as a judge.
- 3. Staging of exhibits will be by appointed stewards except in display classes.
- 4. The Federation or Show Committee shall not be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits.
- 5. The winner of a cup, except for a winner from outside Ireland and the UK, may retain it until the commencement of the Summer Course of the succeeding year, on which date it must be returned in good order and condition to the Hon. Secretary of the National Honey Show.
- 6. The decision of the judges shall be final.
- 7. The judge reserves the right not to award all or any of the prizes in any class.
- 8. An exhibitor shall not be entitled to more than one prize in any one class, or in Supreme Honey awards.
- 9. Gift exhibits and prize-winning exhibits in classes 14, 17 and 18 become the property of the Show Committee and will be disposed of at their discretion during the show.
- 10. A label or other distinguishing mark may not be placed on any exhibit, except in Classes 8 and 9 where labels, which conform to E.U. regulations must be affixed to the exhibits. Numbers should be placed 12mm 15mms from the bottom of the jar and with Sections and Beeswax, one number should be stuck to the exhibit and the other to the covering.
- 11. The decision of the Show Committee on any matter relating to the show (except judging) shall be final.
- 12. Entries must be made on the form provided and posted or emailed so as to reach the Show Secretary by 20th July. Late entries will be accepted up to 11.00 a.m. on Friday 27th July.
- 13. Entries must be placed on the show benches on Friday between 9am and 12 noon. Once an exhibitor has completed the display he/she may not re-enter the Honey Show.
- 14. All Honey and Wax exhibited must be the genuine produce of the exhibitor's own bees.
- 15. Honey Colour: the Judge will use BD standard grading glasses. These will be available from the show secretary. Honey that is found to be the wrong colour for the class it is entered in will be disqualified.
- 16. Wax may be exhibited polished or unpolished at the discretion of the exhibitor. Candles should be displayed in secure, non-combustible holders.
- 17. An exhibit may not be removed until after the show closes. Removal of exhibits will take place on Saturday between 5pm. 6 pm. A steward must accompany you during the process.
- 18. Sections must be enclosed in sections cases. Commercial yellow cases are acceptable.
- 19. Mead must be shown in clear, colourless punted wine bottles, without lettering, fluting, or ornamentation of any kind. Bottles must be corked with flanged stoppers, which must be removable without the use of a corkscrew.
- 20. Extracted honey must be exhibited in plain, clear glass jars with either plain gold lacquered or Federation of Irish Beekeepers' Associations GLC lids.
- 21. Photographic Class: All exhibits must have been taken, but not necessarily processed by the entrant. The subject should be connected with bees or beekeeping. Each exhibit must be suitably mounted. The maximum size of the photograph is A4 (297mm x 210mm) excluding the mount.

 Label to be placed on top right hand corner of mount 12mm. approx. from top right hand corner.
- 22. Essay Class:- Theme: Swarm Control. Essay must be no longer than 2000 words.

 Must be submitted to Honey Secretary in PDF form one week before 27th July, and in hard copy on the day of the Show. Winning essay published in Four Seasons Magazine.
- 23. See Class 32 33 I Jar (under 18 years of age) Any miscellaneous product (under 18 years of age). Class 32/33 all Exhibits must be produced by the named under 18 exhibitor.
- 24. Objections: Any protest by an exhibitor must be made in writing to the Show Secretary by 2pm on the Saturday of the show, for consideration by an Appeals Panel, consisting of the Judge's Referee and one other judge who are not otherwise involved with the objection.

 The objection must be accompanied by a deposit of €20. Should the protest be sustained by the Appeals Panel or be considered reasonable, the deposit will be returned.
